



11	Baseball Terms	In baseball, a <i>dugout</i> is a low shelter at the side of a baseball field where a team's coaches and players who are not taking part can sit and watch the game. Traditionally, the home team sits in the dugout to the right of the diamond, and the visitors team sits in the dugout to the left.
11	Baseball Positions	A <i>shortstop</i> (SS) is a fielder positioned in the infield between second and third base. Who are some famous shortstops?
11	Geography	The Baseball Mystery begins in Atlanta, the capital of Georgia. Located in the northern third of the state, Atlanta has a humid subtropical climate, which means it has hot, humid summers and cool winters. Can you find Atlanta on a map?
11	Baseball Teams	The Atlanta Braves are a professional baseball team located in Atlanta, Georgia. The team is one of two remaining charter franchises in Major League Baseball's National League. The Braves were founded in Boston in 1871 where they were called the Boston Red Stockings. The team moved to Milwaukee in 1953 and then to Atlanta in 1966. They have played in Turner Field since 1997.
12	Baseball Terms	A <i>fastball</i> is a baseball pitch thrown at or near a pitcher's maximum speed. It is the most common type of pitch in baseball.
16	Baseball Teams	Slugger played on a <i>minor league</i> baseball team when he was young. A minor league team competes on a lower level than a major league team. It usually is a team where a player gets experience before moving up to a major league team.
16	Baseball Terms	A <i>ground ball</i> , or grounder, is a ball that once hit by the batter rolls or bounces along the ground.
18	Figure of Speech	Grant settled into his stance. What does that mean? Demonstrate how you would settle into a stance to hit a ball.
18	Vocabulary	Grant's eyes were glued to the white <i>sphere</i> coming right at him. What is a sphere? What does this sentence mean?

18	Baseball Rules	Grant squarely hit the bases as he rounded the diamond. Bases are the four stations a player must reach in order to score a run—first base, second base, third base, and home plate.
18	Baseball Terms	A baseball field is referred to as a <i>diamond</i> because the infield is shaped like one.
21	Baseball Traditions	The World Series is a professional championship for Major League Baseball that is played at the end of the season between the champions of the American League and the National League. It was first played in 1903.
21	Baseball Traditions	There are two major leagues in American professional baseball that make up Major League Baseball—the National League and the American League. The National League was founded in 1876. There are currently 16 teams in this league. The American League was founded in 1901 and currently has 14 teams.
22	Baseball Teams	The Pittsburgh Pirates are a professional baseball team located in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. The team is a member of the National League. Established in 1882, the Pirates played in the very first World Series in 1903, but lost to the Boston Red Sox.
22	Geography	Puerto Rico is an unincorporated territory of the United States. It is located in the northeastern Caribbean. Can you find Puerto Rico on a map?
23	Baseball Teams	The Boston Red Sox are a professional baseball team located in Boston, Massachusetts. The team is a member of the American League. Established in 1901, the Red Sox won the first World Series in 1903. The ball club's home ballpark has been Fenway Park since 1912.
25	Vocabulary	When something is <i>authentic</i> , it is genuine, or real.
27	Food	Grant ate a chili dog at the baseball game. What are some other typical foods you might have at a baseball game?
28	Baseball Traditions	Home run derby refers to a game that is played to see who can hit the most home runs.
28	Baseball Terms	What is a <i>batting cage</i> ? Have you ever practiced hitting a ball in a batting cage?

28	Baseball Terms	In baseball, a <i>curve ball</i> is a type of pitch that a pitcher throws so that the ball has forward spin, causing it to dive in a downward path as it approaches the plate.
29	Baseball Traditions	Often, players will sign their names to baseballs and other items for fans before and after a game. Some of these items can become valuable. Do you have any autographed baseballs?
31	Geography	Cooperstown is located in east central New York near the base of the Adirondack Mountains. Can you find the town on a map?
31	Vocabulary	Christina had a touch of <i>sarcasm</i> in her voice when she replied to Grant. What is sarcasm? Say Christina's line aloud with sarcasm in your voice.
34	Vocabulary	Christina thought Slugger looked dejected. What does that mean?
37	Movies	The Bad News Bears is a comedy movie about baseball made in 1976. A remake was released in 2005.
38	Players	Roy Halladay is a Philadelphia Phillies pitcher who made MLB history on May 29, 2010, when he pitched the 20th perfect game in baseball history. In a perfect game, the same pitcher stays in the entire game, and not one batter from the opposing team reaches first base.
39	Players	Derek Jeter is a New York Yankees shortstop known for his on- field leadership qualities and his hitting and fielding abilities.
41	Figure of Speech	Mimi refers to the fellow Papa sold his baseball cards to as "a real character." What does she mean by that?
41	Baseball Teams	The New York Yankees are a professional baseball team located in the Bronx, New York. The team is a member of the American League. The team was founded in 1901 as the Orioles in Baltimore, Maryland. They moved to New York in 1903 and became the Yankees in 1913. The Yankees have a long history of winning World Series and American League championships. The Yankees played in the historic Yankee Stadium from 1923–2008. Today, they play in a new stadium also called Yankee Stadium.

41	Geography	Located in northeastern New York, the Adirondack Mountains are part of the Appalachian Mountains. The Adirondacks consist primarily of metamorphic rocks surrounding a core of intrusive igneous rocks. They are heavily forested with spruce, pine and broad-leafed trees. Can you find the Adirondacks on a map?
42	Vocabulary	The <i>Mystery Girl</i> was sitting on the airport <i>tarmac</i> . A tarmac refers to a runway or other area surfaced with a material consisting of crushed rock mixed with tar.
45	History	The Great Depression refers to the financial and industrial slump that occurred in 1929 and lasted until the United States' entry into World War II.
49	History	What is a timeline? How do you draw one?
49	Baseball Rules	In the first baseball games, pitchers threw underhanded. What does that mean? Can you throw underhanded?
51	Players	Nicknamed "The Flying Dutchman," Honus Wagner was a shortstop who played mostly for the Pittsburgh Pirates. Many baseball historians consider him to be the greatest shortstop ever.
51	Players	An aggressive baseball player with a surly manner, Ty Cobb, known as "The Georgia Peach," is widely credited with setting 90 MLB records during his career. He received the most votes of any player in the first Baseball Hall of Fame ballot in 1936.
51	Players	Cy Young pitched for 5 different teams in his career and established numerous pitching records that still stand, including 511 wins in his career. In 1956, the first annual Cy Young Award was created to honor a season's best pitcher.
52	Baseball Statistics	Commonly referred to as RBIs, "Runs Batted In" is a statistic used in baseball to credit a batter when the outcome of his or her at-bat results in a run being scored.
52	Baseball Statistics	Earned Run Average (ERA) refers to the mean, or average, number of earned runs given up by a pitcher per nine innings pitched. The statistic is used to determine a pitcher's effectiveness. The lower the average, the better job the pitcher is doing.

52	Baseball Terms	In baseball, a <i>strikeout</i> occurs when a batter receives three strikes during his/her time up at bat. Strikeouts are recorded for both batters and pitchers.
56	Baseball Terms	An <i>extra base hit</i> is when a batter hits the ball and advances past first base without the benefit of a fielder either committing an error or opting to make a throw to retire another base runner. Doubles, triples, and home runs are all extra base hits.
57	Baseball Teams	The Milwaukee Braves were a professional baseball team located in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. They won the World Series in 1957. In 1966, they moved to Atlanta to become the Atlanta Braves. In 1969, Milwaukee became the home of the Milwaukee Brewers. The team is a member of the National League.
59	Vocabulary	Discrimination is the treating of some people better than others without any fair or proper reason.
60	Baseball Teams	The Brooklyn Dodgers were a professional baseball team located in Brooklyn, New York. The team was originally called the "Brooklyn Trolley Dodgers" because of the streetcar tracks that bordered two sides of the field where they played in the late 1800s. The Dodgers moved to Los Angeles in 1958.
61	Baseball Teams	The Chicago Cubs are one of two professional baseball teams in Chicago, Illinois. Established in 1870, the National League team has played at Wrigley Field since 1916. The Cubs, who last won a World Series in 1908, are known as "The Lovable Losers."
66	Vocabulary	A <i>scandal</i> is something that offends accepted moral standards or disgraces those associated with it.
67	Baseball Teams	The Chicago White Sox are one of two professional baseball teams located in Chicago, Illinois. Established in 1900, the team was originally called the Chicago White Stockings. For 80 years, the American League team played in historic Comiskey Park. Today, it plays in U.S. Cellular Field, nicknamed "The Cell" by fans.

67	Baseball Teams	The Cincinnati Reds are a professional baseball team located in Cincinnati, Ohio. Established in 1882, the American League team was originally called the Cincinnati Red Stockings. From 1970 – 2003, the Reds played in Riverfront Stadium on the Mississippi River. Today, they play next door in the Great American Ball Park.
68	Movies	The 1989 movie <i>Field of Dreams</i> is a fantasy drama based on the novel <i>Shoeless Joe</i> by W. P. Kinsella. The baseball field set built on a farm in Dyersville, Iowa, has become a tourist attraction.
71	Baseball Rules	A major league baseball season consists of 162 games played over 178 to 183 days. It typically runs from early April to late September and is followed by postseason play in October.
72	History	Babe Ruth was in the first group of five men inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1936. The other four were Ty Cobb, Honus Wagner, Christy Mathewson, and Walter Johnson.
77	Geography	South Williamsport is located in northeast Pennsylvania along the West Branch Susquehanna River and is adjacent to parts of the Appalachian Mountains and the Allegheny Plateau. Can you find South Williamsport on a map?
77	Vocabulary	Teams of boys <i>milled</i> around. This means they moved about in a disorderly mass.
79	Baseball Terms	Home plate is the place where a baseball batter stands. A base runner must touch home plate in order to score a run.
83	Vocabulary	Christina whiffed the ball three times. What does this mean?
85	Movies	A League of Their Own is a fictionalized story about the real-life All American Girls Professional Baseball League.
86	Emotions	Christina was feeling paranoid. This means she was extremely fearful and suspicious. Have you ever felt paranoid? Why?
87	Geography	Louisville, the largest city in Kentucky, is located on the south banks of the Ohio River across from the state of Indiana. It is in the Bluegrass Region of Kentucky where the land is generally rolling hills and the soil is very fertile. Its climate is humid subtropical, meaning it has hot, humid summers and mild to cool winters. Can you find Louisville on a map?

88	Players	Ted Williams played his entire 21-year career as the left fielder of the Boston Red Sox. Because of his great hitting ability, he was nicknamed "The Greatest Hitter Who Ever Lived."
90	Players	Nicknamed "Joltin' Joe" and the "Yankee Clipper," Joe DiMaggio was a New York Yankees star from 1936-51. He was renowned for his outstanding batting ability and outfield play.
90	Players	Ken Griffey, Jr., who played center field for several different teams, was one of the best home run hitters and defensive players in baseball history. He won 10 Gold Glove awards and appeared in 13 All-Star games.
91	Vocabulary	Demonstrate how you would sidestep around something.
93	Vocabulary	A <i>logo</i> is a symbol or motto that identifies something. What are some famous logos?
94	Players	First baseman Albert Pujols is a current baseball player who has one of the best batting averages in baseball. ESPN.com selected him as the Most Valuable Player of the decade from 2000-2009.
94	Players	In 1956, Mickey Mantle, who played his entire 18-year career with the New York Yankees, led the American League in batting average, home runs, and runs batted in. Mantle is regarded as the greatest switch hitter of all time, meaning he could bat equally well right-handed or left-handed.
95	Baseball Traditions	The Major League All-Star Game is an annual baseball game between players from the American and National leagues. It takes place in early July and marks the symbolic halfway point in the MLB season. Fans, players, coaches, and managers vote to select the players who participate.
101	Geography	Boston, the capital of Massachusetts, is one of the oldest cities in the United States. It is a very compact city with a dense population and the only capital city in the contiguous United States with an ocean coastline. Boston sits 19 feet above sea level. Boston Harbor separates East Boston from Boston. Can you find Boston on a map?

107	Geography	Located in central Maryland on the Patapsco River near where it empties into the Chesapeake Bay, Baltimore is the largest U.S. seaport in the Mid-Atlantic. The city sits on the fall line between the Piedmont Plateau and the Atlantic Coastal Plain, which divides Baltimore into "lower city" and "upper city." The elevation of the town ranges from sea level to 480 feet. Can you find Baltimore on a map?
113	Geography	Located at the mouth of the Hudson River on one of the world's largest natural harbors, New York City is the most populous city in the United States. New York City consists of five boroughs that were consolidated in 1898: The Bronx, Brooklyn, Manhattan, Queens, and Staten Island. Can you find New York City on a map?
114	Emotions	Grant was worried about Christina's feelings. Why? Have you ever been concerned about someone's feelings who was not able to do what you were doing? How did you act toward that person?
115	Movies	The Natural is a 1984 film adaptation of a novel by the same name by Bernard Malamud. It's about a baseball player named Roy Hobbs who had great natural baseball talent.
118	Vocabulary	Babe Ruth's best years <i>coincided</i> with the Yankees' winning history. Explain what the word coincided means.
119	Players	Nicknamed "Mr. October," Reggie Jackson was particularly known for his clutch hitting—a baseball player with a knack for coming up with a game-deciding hit—in postseason play with the New York Yankees.
119	Players	Whitey Ford, who played his entire 18-year career with the New York Yankees, was the team's No. 1 pitcher. He was nicknamed the "Chairman of the Board" for his ability to stay calm, cool, and collected in high-pressure situations.
119	Players	Nicknamed "The Iron Horse," first baseman Lou Gehrig played his entire 17-year career with the New York Yankees. He holds the record for most career grand slams—home runs hit with all three bases occupied by runners— and was voted the greatest first baseman of all time by the Baseball Writers' Association in 1969.

123	History	World War II (1939-45) was a war in which an alliance including the United Kingdom, the Soviet Union, and the United States defeated the Axis Powers (Germany, Italy, and Japan).
128	Emotions	Why is Christina so excited? What do you think it would be like to play ball at a huge stadium like Yankee Stadium?
130	Baseball Terms	The <i>leadoff hitter</i> is the batter who bats first in the lineup.
130	Baseball Terms	The most common type of base hit, a <i>single</i> , occurs when a batter safely reaches first base by hitting a fair ball and getting to first base before a fielder can put him/her out.
130	Baseball Terms	A <i>base hit</i> is credited to a batter when the batter can advance safely to first base without aid of an error committed by the team on the field.
130	Baseball Terms	A <i>sacrifice fly</i> is when a batter hits a ball to the outfield that is caught but allows a runner on base to score a run. There must be less than two outs for this play to work.
141	Vocabulary	What does <i>iconic</i> mean? What does Papa mean when he says, "Two coasts, two iconic baseball stadiums!"

# Discussion Questions

- 1. In the very first chapter of the book, Christina and Slugger McCoy talk about baseball. They have differing views about the game. Discuss reasons why Christina does not care for the game and why Slugger loves it. How does Christina feel about baseball by the end of the book? What do you think made her change her mind?
- 2. Papa, Mimi, and the kids go to Cooperstown where the National Baseball Hall of Fame is located. Why is this an important place for baseball fans? Discuss some of the things you learned about the game of baseball as the kids visited Cooperstown.
- 3. What is discrimination? Discuss discrimination as it applies to the Negro American League and the All-American Girls Professional Baseball League. Why were those leagues created? What is different about the issue of discrimination in baseball today?
- 4. At the Little League World Series, the kids get a chance to play ball with some of the Little Leaguers. What changes did you see in Christina as she began to practice catching, throwing, and batting?
- 5. Throughout the book, Mimi and/or Slugger McCoy say that life is like baseball. What do they mean by that? Find all the places in the book where someone compares life to baseball.
- 6. List all the clues the kids found. At any point, did you think you knew the solution to the mystery? If so, when? Was it a good mystery? Why or why not?

# Take Me Out to the Ball Game

"Take Me Out to the Ball Game" is a famous song baseball fans sing during the 7th inning stretch. Jack Norworth wrote the song in 1908 on a scrap of paper as he rode a New York City subway train. Norworth, who had never been to a baseball game, was inspired by a sign on the train that said, "Baseball Today - Polo Grounds." He gave the lyrics to Albert Von Tilzer, who composed the music. The song became an instant hit.

There are several verses to the song, but this is the one sung at ball games today:

"Take me out to the ball game,

Take me out with the crowd.

Buy me some peanuts and cracker jack,

I don't care if I never get back.

Let me root, root, root for the home team.

If they don't win it's a shame.

For it's one, two, three strikes, you're out,

At the old ball game."

# Geography: Find It!

- 1. On a map of the United States, find Atlanta, Georgia, and mark it. Now, using your book, find all the cities and states that Papa, Mimi, and the kids traveled to and mark those places. Use a highlighter to trace their journey from one place to another. At the end of the book, Papa said they would go to Dodger Stadium in Los Angeles, California. Include that in their journey.
- 2. Find your location on the same map in Question #1. Plan your own baseball trip. Use a different colored highlighter to trace your journey. How many miles will you have to travel? How will you travel to each location?
- 3. Use whatever resources you have to find the longitude and latitude of each of the locations the kids visited. What is the elevation of each location?
- 4. Using the Internet and Google Earth, find each of the towns Mimi, Papa, and the kids visited. Zoom in on the map and see if you can locate the exact location they visited (like the National Baseball Hall of Fame, Fenway Park, Yankee Stadium, etc.).
- 5. Pick one town the kids visited. Write a report on the geographical features of that town. Use the Internet and any books you have to find information. Mountains, valleys, rivers, and oceans are all things you should consider in your report.

# Baseball by the Numbers

- The first professional baseball team was the Cincinnati Red Stockings in 1869.
- The oldest Major League Baseball stadium currently in use is Boston's Fenway Park built in 1912.
- The first World Series was played in 1903.
   The Boston Americans (now the Red Sox) beat the Pittsburgh Pirates 5-3.
- To date (2011), the team with the most World Series wins is the New York Yankees (27), followed by the St. Louis Cardinals (11), and the Boston Red Sox (7).
- The National League currently has 16 teams.
- The American League currently has 14 teams.
- The winningest pitcher on record is Cy Young with 511 wins. Second is Walter Johnson with 417 wins.
- To date (2011), the home run record holder is Barry Bonds (762 home runs), followed by Hank Aaron (755), and Babe Ruth (714).

### **Elements of a Story**

Every story has to have several essential elements:

Setting – where and when the story takes place

Characters – the people in the story

Exposition – background information on characters and setting explained at the beginning of the story

Plot – all the major events and action in the story

Conflict – the problem faced by the characters

Climax – when the conflict of the plot is resolved

Resolution – the end of the story

Theme – a general idea or "universal truth" that is derived from the story

### **Baseball Facts**

- Inning A turn at bat for each team is called an inning.
- Umpire Umpires referee baseball games.
   They decide all close calls, and their word is final.
- Uniform Numbers The New York Yankees was the first team to put numbers on their uniform backs. The first numbers were assigned by batting order. Today, the player's number has nothing to do with batting order.
- Retired Numbers A team will sometimes retire a number, meaning no one on that team can wear that number again.
- Pennant The team that represents the National League or the American League in the World Series is said to have won "the pennant."
- World Series The World Series is played as a best-of-seven series. This means the first team to win 4 games wins the Series, and there can't be more than 7 games.

- 2. Make a short comic book about Christina and Grant's baseball road trip. Pick three of your favorite scenes from the book to illustrate, including scenery, characters, and dialogue.
- 3. The kids had their very own All-Star baseball card made at the Louisville Slugger Factory. You can make your own baseball card, too! Look at any baseball cards you may have, or search the Internet for baseball cards to guide your drawing. Draw a picture of yourself wearing an All-Star jersey on 8.5" x 11" paper. Now, make a list of your statistics! This would include your name and any other things you might want to tell about yourself (names of parents and siblings, birthday, school, favorite color, etc.). Once you have the statistics you want, take another piece of paper and list them all! Paste the drawing of yourself on one side of the card and your "stats" on the other side!
- 4. Draw your favorite scene from *The Baffling Baseball Mystery*. Discuss that scene in front of the class and explain why that was your favorite scene. (A variation of this is to go through the book and select one scene for each person in the class to draw. When they are finished with the drawings, let the students tell the story of *The Baffling Baseball Mystery* by discussing the drawings, or "scenes" in order.)

# **Bonus Info!**Rules of the Game

In the game of baseball, a batter hits the ball, then tries to make it to first base or farther without getting called out. The batter who runs around all the bases scores a run. The team with the most runs at the end of the game wins!

Teams take turns at bat. A team keeps batting until it makes three outs. Then that team pitches to the other team until they make three outs. The most common ways to make an out are:

- Strikeout If a batter swings and misses, or doesn't swing at a good pitch, it's a strike. Three strikes and the batter is out.
- Fly out If a fielder catches a batted ball before it hits the ground, the batter is out.
- Ground out If a fielder throws the ball to first base before the batter gets there, the batter is
- Tag out If a runner is not touching a base and is tagged with the ball, the runner is out.

After each team has had nine turns at bat (or fewer turns in Little League), the game is over.

### Science: Cook It!

### Wrigley Field Chicago-Style Grill Cart Hot Dog

Use all-beef hot dogs and poppy seed buns! Grill the hot dogs until well browned. Transfer the hot dogs to buns and top with the Wrigley-style toppings of your choice: grilled sliced onions, diced tomatoes, mild banana peppers, sweet relish, catsup, mustard, and celery salt.

### **Hot Dog Slaw**

½ med. head of cabbage, grated

2 tbsp. onion, grated

2 tbsp. sweet pickle relish

Mayonnaise & mustard to taste

½ tsp. black pepper

1 tsp. sugar

2 tsp. vinegar (optional)

Mix ingredients well and chill.

### **Coney Island Chili Dogs**

1 lb. lean ground beef

1 (12-ounce) jar chili sauce

1 (1.48-ounce) packet chili seasoning

1/4 cup water

1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce

1 tbs. yellow mustard

½ tsp. onion powder

In a pot over medium heat, brown the ground beef, stirring constantly to break up the clumps. Add the rest of the ingredients. Bring to a boil, lower the heat, and simmer for 30 minutes. Place hot dogs in buns and top with chili. Top off with cheddar cheese and chopped white onion if desired!

### **Bonus Info!**

### **Defensive Positions**

If a team is not batting, it is fielding, or playing defense. The job of the nine players on the field is to field the ball and put the batters out.

- Pitcher Throws the ball to the batter to start the action on the field. Pitchers also can field ground balls to help out the infielders.
- Catcher Crouches behind home plate to catch any pitches that the batter doesn't hit. If a runner tries to steal a base, the catcher tries to throw the runner out.
- Infielders Play first base, second base, shortstop, and third base. They play close to the bases and the batter. They field ground balls and try to throw out the batter.
- Outfielders Play right field, center field, and left field. They play far away from the bases and batter. Mainly, they try to catch fly balls and throw the ball back to the infielders.

### Activities

### Make Some Baseball Posters

There are 16 National League teams and 14 American League teams in Major League Baseball. Depending on how many students you have, assign each student one team to research, or divide the class into groups. Each group can take on several teams. Gather art supplies and pieces of poster board for this art project.

### Step One:

Use books and the Internet to find information on each team in the two leagues. For each team, find the team logo, colors, cap insignia, and current uniform. Other information should include the team's nicknames, stadium name, best-known players (historical and current), and World Series championships (if any).

### Step Two:

Use construction paper, paint, crayons, and other materials, to make a poster for each team. Make a pennant from construction paper, or felt, and attach it to the poster. Draw the team's logo and paste it on. Find a photo of the team's stadium and paste it on. Attach old baseball game ticket stubs or an old program. Write or draw the rest of the information directly onto the poster when you need to, but in general, make each poster display as creative and as chock full of information as possible.

### Step Three:

Once all the posters are completed, make a presentation to the class about each of the teams. As each team is presented, a student helper can stick a pushpin in the correct team location on a big map of the United States!


