Word from the Author

Dear Teachers,

In 1979, I began writing children's mysteries set at historic sites that still existed primarily so that kids could go and see what they had read about. Frankly, I found no

more fun, educational, and stress-free (actually, just plain joyful!) activity to do with my then school-age children than to visit a

fascinating historic site!

The Outer Banks of North carolina hold so much natural beauty and interesting history that everyone should visit them at least once. The 2003 flight centennial celebration is sure to attract thousands of visitors from around the world. Even if you can't go, you can fly over the sand dunes with these adventurous mystery characters.

Yes, Kill Devil Hills is a tourist attraction, but it's also one gigantic history lesson. At every site, I tried to introduce the who, what, when, where, why, and how of the places. Not only has it been surprising to me how fascinated the kids are in real life, but it is amazing to also witness the depth of their interest. The first set of these magical experiences eventually transcended into a lifelong ongoing connection between me and my children.

We learned a lot, but what we learned best is that kids and adults can learn together. Reading and going and seeing and doing is what education is all about, and most especially, that "adopting" a subject or place leads to a lifelong interest in an era, a place, the people, and all the fascinating facts that made up their lives. We learned that history is still "living" and is not lost on kids! In fact, it is guite a revelation!

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As a mother and an author, one of the fondest periods of my life was when I decided to write mystery books for children. At this time (1979) kids were pretty much glued to the TV, something parents and teachers complained about the way they do about video games today.

I decided to set each mystery in a real place—a place kids could go and visit for themselves after reading the book. And I also used real children as characters. Usually a couple of my own children served as characters, and I had no trouble recruiting kids from the book's location to also be characters.

Also, I wanted all the kids—boys and girls of all ages—to participate in solving the mystery. And, I wanted kids to learn something as they read. Something about the history of the location. And I wanted the stories to be funny.

That formula of real+scary+smart+fun served me well. The kids and I had a great time visiting each site and many of the events in the stories actually came out of our experiences there. (For example, we really did stick our toes in the cold ocean, climb Jockey's Ridge, and see *Flyer* for ourselves!)

I love getting letters from teachers and parents who say they read the book with their class or child, then visited the historic site and saw all the places in the mystery for themselves. What's so great about that? What's great is that you and your children have an experience that bonds you together forever. Something you shared. Something you both cared about at the time. Something that crossed all age levels—a good story, a good scare, a good laugh!



The Hungry Sand Dune

Jockey's Ridge is the largest mountain of sand on the Atlantic Coast. The dune's name originates back to the horse races that were once held at its base.

Since several spectators could sit comfortably on the dune "grandstand" banks, the site was ideal for the purpose. Marsh ponies, which had escaped ship wrecks, raced wild and free in these contests.

Though Jockey's Ridge is the peak of the sand mountain, sand dunes on each side moved about so much that they once engulfed an old resort hotel until it was eventually completely buried!

Dare County

Part of the mystery book takes place in Dare County, which lies in northeastern North Carolina along the Atlantic seaboard. The county has six municipalities: Duck, Kill Devil Hills, Kitty Hawk, Manteo, Nags Head, and Southern Shores. Dare County encompasses approximately two-thirds of the North Carolina coastline, including:

- Fort Raleigh National Historic Site

- Jockey's Ridge State Park

Established in 1870, Dare County was named for Virginia Dare, the first child born of English parents in America. Manteo, where the kids and their grandparents first land the airplane, is the county seat. This city is about 200 miles east of Raleigh, the state capital of North Carolina. Manteo is also pretty close to Virginia. It's only about 90 miles south of Virginia Beach and Norfolk.

The population of Dare County is around 29,000. Since the county features so many popular tourism spots, between 200,000 to 225,000 people visit the area every June through August.

Cape Hatteras National Seashore

People around the country will celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Cape Hatteras National Seashore on August 25, 2003. A series of events will celebrate the commemorative occasion.


The first national seashore in America, Cape Hatteras was authorized August 17, 1937 and established on January 12, 1953. The Cape Hatteras Lighthouse is perhaps the most photographed, visited, and recognized lighthouse in North America.

Once dubbed the "Graveyard of the Atlantic," this seashore encompasses 75 miles of beautiful barrier islands, which are also wintering habitats for several types of migrating waterfowl.

The site, which includes approximately 30,000 acres, extends from Ocracoke Inlet to south Nags Head, and its dangerous currents, shoals, and storms don't discourage its thousands of visitors from flocking to this site each year.

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Hurricanes & Nor'easters

Hurricanes

- stretch 200-300 miles across
- warm core
- · symmetrical shape
- can usually find the center
- usually pass through a location in 6-8 hours
- intensity of 74 knots and higher
- occurs June to November
- easily spotted by satellites
- occurs more often in the south and less frequent north of the Carolinas
- born out of thunderstorm clusters over warm water
- damage is extreme, but limited in size

Nor'easters

- can reach 1,000 miles across
- core usually contains cold
- irregular shape
- center often hard to locate
- · could last a week
- 20-30 form each year, but only a few develop into significant storms
- intensity of 35-40 knots onshore, and higher over the ocean
- occurs October through April
- can pop up out of various conditions
- usually hits the north coast
- born out of the Jet Stream
- remnants of hurricanes can feed a Nor'easter
- damage is not as extreme, but covers a much larger area with more loss of life

Discussion Questions

- ❖ Discuss how long it took for the Wright brothers to pilot their first successful flight. Talk about the experiments, the mechanical toys, the kites, the bike shop, and the gliders. Explain the system of trial and error. Ask students for personal examples of things they have tried several times to do, like learning to ride a bike or play the piano.
- ♦ How can kids help adults with problems? When is best for kids to not get involved with adult matters? Discuss Christina's legitimate concern for Papa's safety, and how the adults handled the matter.
- ❖ Ask the class to compile a list of important inventions in history such as the printing press, steam engine, cotton gin, telephone, automobile, airplane, computer, etc. on the board. Ask the students which invention they think was the most important to human technological development. Discuss the role that each invention played in history and what life would be like without it today. An assignment idea might be to ask students to devise their own invention to solve an existing need or problem in life.
- ❖ Discuss various types of natural disasters including hurricanes, fires, floods, tidal waves, earthquakes, nor'easters, typhoons, volcanic eruptions, heat waves, monsoons, blizzards, freezes, tornadoes, and others. Where do each of these occur most often? What can people do to protect themselves from these disasters? Talk about safety tips, historical events such as the Mount St. Helens eruption and the Great Chicago fire, and current advanced technology that helps fight these disasters better.
- ❖ Discuss the relationship between fact and fiction. Ask your students to give their definition of each. Explain historical fiction.
- ❖ Talk about history and man's need to preserve and remember it. Ask the class to come up with a list of reasons for preserving history and how to do this.
- ❖ Discuss the following quote: "We were lucky enough to grow up in an environment where there was always much encouragement to children to pursue intellectual interests; to investigate whatever aroused their curiosity. In a different environment, our curiosity might have been nipped long before it could have borne fruit." Orville Wright



North Carolina Trivia

- Incorporated in 1705, Bath is the oldest town in North Carolina!
- In 1914, Herman "Babe" Ruth hit his first home run in Fayetteville, North Carolina!



- The largest tree in North Carolina is a bald cypress that stands northwest of Windsor. It is 138 feet tall and boasts a circumference of more than 38 feet!
- A museum on Harkers Island honors the heritage of carving decoy ducks.
- Only about 200 people live in the former fishing village of Calabash, North Carolina, but there is a seafood restaurant for every 10 residents!
- The Bald-Headed Men of America Headquarters is located in Morehead City, North Carolina. The organization holds an annual convention at Mrs. Willis' Restaurant!
- Built in 1734 with brick shipped from England, St. Thomas Episcopal Church in Bath is the oldest church in North Carolina. Artifacts include a 1704 Bible and candlesticks donated by King George II and a bell that is 18 years older than the Liberty Bell!

- 3. Draw a mechanical blueprint of the Wright Brothers' airplane. Then make a model of it with balsa wood and wood glue. Look in the mystery to find out the other materials the brothers used to make their first plane. Map the journey from Dayton, Ohio to Kill Devil Hills, North Carolina on paper.
- 4. What is the latitude and longitude of Kill Devil Hills, North Carolina?
- 5. Draw a map of the Outer Banks. Plot several cities, major attractions, geographic landmarks, and historic points of interest. Include a key, map symbols, title, and chart of locations.
- 6. Compare Kill Devil Hills and Raleigh, the capital of North Carolina. What are the differences between the two cities? What are the similarities? In which city would you like to live? Why?
- 7. Construct a model of Kill Devil Hills and the Wright Brothers
 National Memorial with sand and gray modeling clay or other
 materials. You could even include the kids' tent, the hang glider, and
 the museum!

speed: the rate of motion, or how fast something can go



Wright Brothers Trivia

- Wilbur was born in Indiana, and Orville was born in Ohio.
- The boys' father served as a bishop of the United Brethren Church.
- Neither Wilbur nor Orville graduated from high school.
- The Wright brothers earned spending money by selling mechanical toys they made at home.
- Flyer cost less than \$1,000 to build.
- The Wright brothers tested more than 200 different wing models in their wind tunnel.
- The brothers conducted nearly 1,000 flights in their 1902 glider.
- Orville and Wilbur flipped a coin to see who would make the historic flight at Kitty Hawk.
- Flyer was constructed of wooden poles, baling wire, muslin cloth, bicycle chains, and a gasoline engine that had no more power than a lawnmower!
- Wilbur once flew an airplane around the Statue of Liberty!

Kitchen: Cook It!

The sweet potato is the state vegetable of North Carolina. Bake this State Sweet Potato Casserole and Carolina Hush Puppies for a coastal meal! Roast some Beach Bonfire Bites for dessert!

State Sweet Potato Casserole

Ingredients

4 cups sweet potatoes, peeled and cubed

2 cups granulated sugar

4 eggs, beaten

3/4 cup margarine, melted

1 cup evaporated milk

1 tsp. ground nutmeg

1 tsp. ground cinnamon

2 cups mini marshmallows

1.5 cups crushed corn flake cereal

1/2 cup packed brown sugar

1 cup minced pecans

3/4 cup margarine, melted



Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 400° F.
- 2. Mash sweet potatoes in a large bowl.
- 3. Mix granulated sugar, eggs, 3/4 cup margarine, milk, nutmeg, cinnamon, and marshmallows with potatoes.
- 4. Move mixture into a 9x13 inch greased baking dish.
- 5. Bake 20 minutes in the preheated oven.
- 6. Combine cereal, brown sugar, pecans, and 3/4 cup margarine in a small bowl.
- 7. Spread the mixture over the baked casserole.
- 8. Bake the casserole another 10 minutes in the 400° F oven.
- 9. Serve warm!





Side Suggestions

Carolina Hush Puppies

Ingredients

- 2 eggs, beaten
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 1 large onion, diced
- 1 cup self-rising flour
- 1 cup self-rising cornmeal
- 1 quart oil

Directions

Mix eggs, sugar, and onion. Blend in the flour and cornmeal. Heat 2 inches of oil to 365° F. Drop batter by rounded teaspoonfuls into the heated oil. Fry the dough in small batches until golden brown. Drain briefly on paper towels. Serve hot!

Beach Bonfire Bites!

Ingredients

- 1 box of graham crackers
- 1 bag of large
- marshmallows
- 4 chocolate bars

Directions

- 1. Roast a marshmallow over a campfire pit (don't burn it!).
- 2. Place some chocolate sections between two sections of graham cracker.
- 3. Add the softened marshmallow between the chocolate and cracker.
- 4. Let the heated marshmallow soften the chocolate till slightly
- 5. Chomp on your beach bonfire bite!


The Mystery at Kill Devil Hills Kite

- a strip of fabric or party streamers or a ribbon (This is for the tail and should be about 48" to keep your kite from spinning out of control.)




