



12	Vocabulary	To <i>stifle</i> means to conceal or hide. Papa could not conceal his laughter at Grant's joke!
13	Trivia	According to the Federal Highway Administration, there are more than 1,200 rest areas on the interstate highway system.
13	Literature	When Grant says, "My kingdom for a drawbridge," he is referring to a line in one of Shakespeare's plays, <i>King Richard III</i> . After King Richard's horse is killed, he cries, "My horse! My horse! My kingdom for a horse!" The quote is often repeated when a person needs something important.
13	Figure of Speech	When the writer says that Grant's nose was so cold that the end of it was "beating like a heart," he is using a figure of speech called a simile. A simile compares two unlike things, usually in a phrase introduced by <i>like</i> or <i>as</i> .
14	History	The first Saint Paul Winter Carnival took place in 1886. Local business leaders wanted to prove a New York newspaper writer wrong who had described the city as "another Siberia, unfit for human habitation in the winter."
15	Imagery	Grant's breath is described as "puffs of smoky vapor that floated away like chilly ghosts." Can you picture it?
19	Natural Disasters	On Tuesday, January 12, 2010, a powerful earthquake struck the nation of Haiti. The Haitian government estimates that more than 220,000 people died in the quake. Can you find Haiti on a map?
21	Character Analysis	Chester and Shirley want to adopt twin boys they saw in Haiti. What does this tell you about this couple?
25	Vocabulary	Something that is <i>counterfeit</i> is an imitation represented as being the original item.

26	Geography	Twin cities are cities so close to each other that they grow together over time. Dallas and Fort Worth, Texas are another example of twin cities.
28	Clothing	A <i>parka</i> is a long jacket with a hood. It is often lined with fur or fake fur.

54	Sculpture	Bronze is a mixture of copper and tin. It is commonly used to make statues because it expands just before it sets, ensuring that the details of a mold are filled with the metal.

55	Cartoons	The <i>Peanuts</i> character Schroeder spends most of his time playing a toy piano. Can you play a musical instrument?
56	Science	Grant's saliva froze to the statue. Don't try to imitate that stunt!! The colder the temperature of the metal, the quicker your lips or tongue will stick to it.
56	Expressions	When Christina doesn't "know whether to laugh or cry," she finds the situation funny and frightening at the same time.
59	Feelings	How do you think Grant felt when he couldn't remove his lips from the statue? Is this scene funny or scary to you?
60	Character Traits	When Julie and Jim refuse to leave Grant and Christina, what does that tell you about their friendship?
60	Expressions	What does it mean to "get carried away" by something?
61	Idioms	If something is "as good as new," either it has been kept in the same quality condition as when it was new, or it has been repaired to the same condition as when it was new. What is Mr. Snowdon telling Grant when he uses that expression?
62	Spelling	When the author uses misspellings like "annudder" or "liss," what is she trying to help the reader understand about Grant's injured lips?
63	Word Origin	A <i>comforter</i> is bedding made of two layers of cloth filled with stuffing and stitched together. How do you think this bedding got its name?
64	Weather	Christina and Grant live in Georgia. In Georgia's capital city of Atlanta, July is typically the hottest month with an average temperature of 88 degrees. What is the hottest month where you live?

64	Human Body	Kids from 7 to 12 years of age need about 10 to 11 hours of sleep per night. Why would someone be in a better mood after "a good night's sleep"?
64	Imagery	When "rays of sun as sharp as spears" stab Christina's eyes, what is the author trying to say? Is the sunlight bright or dim?
65	Science	Christina zaps Grant with a static charge. A static charge occurs when there is an excess of positive or negative charges on an object's surface. The shock hurt Grant because it was extremely hot!
66	Birds	Birds eat worms because they are easy to catch and are a good source of protein.
66	Language	When the author says that the "kids wolfed down their stacks of wild blueberry pancakes," what do you see?
69	Automobiles	The letters <i>SUV</i> stand for Sports Utility Vehicle. The term describes a vehicle similar to a station wagon but built on a truck chassis, or frame.
70	Vocabulary	A <i>scalawag</i> can mean several things. After the Civil War, scalawags were Southern whites who supported Reconstruction policies to make money for themselves. A scalawag can also refer to a wicked person, or someone who is mischievous. Which meaning was Papa using when he called the kids scalawags?
70	Animals	Minnesota has two species of gophers. Gophers spend most of their time digging tunnels underground, pushing dirt up in mounds. In one year, a gopher can bring more than two tons of dirt to the surface! They do a lot of damage to landscaping and turf, and their tunnels can cause structures like driveways to collapse!
71	Vocabulary	To be <i>sarcastic</i> is to mean the opposite of what you say. When Christina says, "Thanks for reminding me about that!" she is actually not happy that Jim brought up "Creepy" Karpis.

71	Feelings	Why does Grant get upset when he hears laughter coming from the front of the SUV?
71	Geography	Minnehaha Falls is a 53-foot waterfall located in Minnehaha City Park. The waterfall is created as Minnehaha Creek spills over a rock ledge.
73	Vocabulary	To be <i>dumbfounded</i> is to be shocked and speechless.
75	Animals	The star-nosed mole has 22 pink, fleshy tentacles around its nose. These super-sensitive tentacles are used to help the mole inspect its surroundings and identify food by touching it. The tentacles also cover the mole's nose when it is digging so soil doesn't get in.
77	History	Saint Paul is the capital of Minnesota. Indian mounds in the area present evidence that the Hopewell Native Americans were the first inhabitants.
78	Economics	Once settlers harnessed the power of Saint Anthony Falls to run sawmills and flour mills, Minneapolis became known as the "Flour Milling Capital of the World" from about 1880 to 1930.
80	Society	Graffiti consists of images or lettering marked or painted on rocks or walls. When put on public property, graffiti is considered vandalism and is illegal.
82	City Life	The Minneapolis skyway system links miles and miles of businesses, hotels, restaurants, banks, and other attractions and services. It's a great way to get around town, and stay warm!
83	Imagery	When the author writes that rich, creamy hot chocolate going down Christina's throat felt "like a warm elevator headed for her stomach," what do you see in your mind? What do you feel physically?

84	Living	How would you like living in an apartment in Minneapolis and rarely having to go outside in the winter because of the convenient skyway system? Would you like that? Why or why not?
85	Legend	According to the Winter Carnival legend, Vulcanus Rex is the enemy of King Boreas. Vulcanus Rex battles to end the winter cold and bring summer warmth back to Saint Paul.
86	Vocabulary	Grant speaks in a melodramatic voice. To be <i>melodramatic</i> is to be exaggerate your behavior to have a desired effect.
87	Science	Warm breath on cold glass forms fog because of condensation. When warm air meets the cold surface, the warm air is turned into mist (droplets). Have you ever exhaled on a cold window to make fog?
89	Architecture	Skyscrapers are very tall buildings with many stories. The tallest building in Minneapolis is the 57-story IDS Tower. Have you ever been to the top of a skyscraper?
90	Careers	Do you like to write? Are you curious about many things? Do you like to talk to people? Do you work well on tight deadlines? If so, you might like to be a newspaper reporter! Reporters investigate news events and write reports on them for newspapers. It can be a very exciting job!
92	Life	Papa makes everyone laugh when he comes up with a joke about the stolen running suit. Did you know that laughter is truly good for you? Scientists do not know exactly how it happens, but the latest research tells us that laughter helps boost our immune systems. So, it looks like there's some scientific proof to back up the old saying, "Laughter is the best medicine!"
93	Clothing	A parka is a heavy jacket with a hood often lined with real or fake fur to protect the face from extremely cold temperatures and wind. The garment originated with Arctic Native Americans, who first made it from caribou or seal skin.

93	Shopping	The Mall of America is quite an amazing place! It includes more than 500 stores, 50 restaurants, the Nickelodeon Universe theme park, movie theaters, an aquarium, a miniature golf course, a mirror maze, and much, much more! Would you like to visit the mall?
95	Sea Animals	Jim mentions the sharks in the aquarium at the Mall of America. The sand tiger sharks have an interesting habit. They swim to the surface and ingest gulps of air that they hold in their stomachs. This air allows them to maintain something called "neutral buoyancy," which keeps them motionless in the water as they watch for prey.
96	Feelings	Why does Grant feel like he may have offended Julie and Jim when he tells Mimi he does not want a pink or purple parka? Have you ever offended someone by making comments about their clothing?
96	Language	When Papa says to the kids, "Don't spend it all in one place," what is he trying to tell them?
98	Food	Each day, the sea creatures at Mall of America's Underwater Adventures Aquarium consume more than 100 pounds of food. Add 90 more pounds to that total on the days the sharks are fed!
99	Animals	Jellyfish may look beautiful, but they really pack a punch! Have you ever been stung by a jellyfish? If so, what did it feel like?
102	Personality	Do you like roller coasters? Many people do, and many people don't. Experts say that people who like them a lot typically have a thrill-seeking personality.
104	Human Body	Christina's hands became sweaty because she was nervous while riding the roller coaster. Have you ever had sweaty hands in a stressful situation?

105	Literature	Read the title of Chapter 17. Have you heard that phrase before? If so, where? Why do you think the author uses a familiar phrase as a chapter title?
106	Humor	When Jim says there are no "freezing cold, metal" girls in the Mirror Maze, what is he referring to? Who is he teasing?
107	Language	When Grant ran into a mirror, he rubbed a "growing goose egg" on his forehead. What was growing on his forehead? Why do you think that bump is called a goose egg?
107	Life	A <i>disco ball</i> is a rotating ball covered with mirrors that reflects light to all parts of a room. A disco ball is often suspended from the ceiling in a dance club to deliver a flashing light effect.
108	Feelings	How do you think Christina felt when she could not find her way out of the maze? Have you ever been lost in a maze?
111	Games	Marco Polo is a game of tag usually played in a swimming pool. Some people say it got its name because the famous explorer Marco Polo did not know where he was going when he first set out from Europe to Asia. Have you ever played the game?
112	Behavior	Why did Papa predict that Grant would not want to leave the mall when it was time to go? What does Papa know about his grandson that led to that prediction?
112	Language	What body part is Papa referring to when he says, "My dogs are killing me"?
113	Food	Lutefisk is a traditional Minnesota dish. Can you think of any traditional dishes where you live?
116	Behavior	Were you surprised to find out that Mimi had dressed up as Klondike Kate and performed on the stage? What does that tell you about Mimi's personality?

118	Literature	Little House on the Prairie was made into a television series. It ran on the NBC network from 1974 to 1982.
119	Animals	The walleye is Minnesota's state fish. The walleye gets its name from its large glassy pupils that reflect light, allowing the fish to see and feed at night or in murky water.
119	Weather	Why are winters so cold in Minnesota? Minnesota is located at a high latitude. This means that winter nights are long and not much sunlight is available to warm things up during winter days. In addition, Minnesota has no natural barriers to fend off blasts of arctic air.
121	Imagery	When the author says. "Christina could feel the blood drain from her face," what is she feeling?
124	Animals	Siberian Huskies resemble wolves. They have blue or brown eyes, and a two-layer coat to keep them warm. They love to run and be outdoors—the perfect personality for a sled dog!
130	Language	When Grant says that his middle name is "monkey," what does he mean?
137	Behavior	When Grant and Christina immediately give the check to Chester and Shirley, what does that tell you about them?

Discussion Questions

- 1. Grant and Christina take a trip to the Twin Cities in winter. It's really cold!!! What are some things that people who live in cold climates have to deal with? What are some important precautions they need to take just living their everyday lives in the winter?
- 2. Papa's friend Chester and his wife helped the earthquake victims in Haiti and want to adopt two Haitian children. What does that tell you about Chester and Shirley? Do you know anyone from another country who was adopted by an American family?
- 3. The Saint Paul Winter Carnival lasts for 10 days and includes more than 100 winter sports and entertainment events all around the city. Why do you think cities sponsor such large events like this carnival? Does your city or town have a similar event each year?
- 4. The kids visit Rice Park where they see statues of characters from the *Peanuts* comic strip. The mild-mannered Charlie Brown is the main character of the *Peanuts* gang. Charlie is nervous, not very good at sports or things like flying a kite, but the public loves him. Why do you think Charlie Brown is so popular? If you have ever seen a *Peanuts* cartoon, or seen a *Peanuts* movie, what do you like about Charlie?
- 5. One of Minnesota's nicknames is "Land of 10,000 Lakes." Other than ice fishing, what are some fun things to do on a lake in the winter? What are some fun things to do in the summer?
- 6. The mighty Mississippi River runs through the Twin Cities. Why was it important for early settlements to be near a river?

Bonus Info!

Land of Lakes!

One of Minnesota's nicknames is "Land of 10,000 Lakes." When viewed from the air, it looks like there are lakes all over the place! In fact, Minnesota has more than 11,000 lakes that cover more than 10 acres. Some lakes have "size" names like One-Mile Lake or Round Lake. Some have animal names like Buffalo, Cormorant, or Heron. Others are named after plants, trees, or people.

With so much water around, it's not surprising that many Minnesotans own boats or that water sports are so popular in the state. Many towns sponsor fishing tournaments, and residents love to paddle canoes or kayaks, go on river rafting or tubing expeditions, scuba dive, or float around on houseboats. And don't forget waterskiingwhich was actually invented by a Minnesota teen in 1922!

Mathematics: Calculate It!

- 1. A heat wave in July 1936 caused a record-high temperature of 114°F in Moorhead, Minnesota. Convert that temperature to a Celsius scale by following these steps: Subtract 32 from the Fahrenheit temperature, and then divide that sum by 1.8. What is your answer? (You can round it up to the nearest whole number.)
- 2. Create a bar graph showing the tallest skyscrapers in Minneapolis and St. Paul. For Minneapolis, you will show the IDS Tower (792 feet) and the Capella Tower (775 feet). For Saint Paul, you will show Wells Fargo Place (471 feet), and Galtier Plaza (443 feet).
- 3. The snowiest Minneapolis winter on record was 1983-84 when 98.6 inches of snow fell. How many feet was that? How many years ago did that occur?
- 4. Winter weather can be treacherous for drivers. On one December day between 7 a.m. and 3 p.m., the Minnesota State Patrol responded to 392 instances of vehicles spinning or sliding off the road, 13 crashes with injuries, and 79 crashes involving vehicle damage. How many total incidents did they respond to? What was the average number of incidents per hour?
- 5. A storage container at the Saint Paul Winter Carnival can hold 800 cans of soda for refreshments. If carnival organizers order 18,000 cans of soda, how many storage containers will they need?
- 6. If the 2011 Saint Paul Winter Carnival were the 125th event, in what year was the first event held?

Minnesota's Biggest Son

In the mid 1800s, the timber industry was big business in Minnesota. Lumberjacks cut logs in the forest and floated them down the rivers to mills where they were trimmed and processed into wood products.

Soon, the legend of lumberjack Paul Bunyan was born. As the story goes, five storks had to carry the child to his parents because he was so big! By the time he was a year old, he had to use wagon wheels for buttons! And not only did Paul grow fast, but so did his pet blue ox, Babe. Legend says that Babe was so big that a lake formed wherever she stepped!

Massive statues of Paul and Babe have stood in Bemidji, Minnesota, since 1937. Paul stands 18 feet tall and weighs more than 2 tons. Babe is no slouch, either—she weighs 5 tons!

Art: Create It!

- 1. Sketch portraits of each mystery book character. Add specific details in the background of each picture. For example, you might add a roller coaster behind Grant because he enjoyed riding it so much. Or, you might put a star-nosed mole in Christina's picture because it bit her!
- 2. Use modeling clay to create several Siberian Husky sled dogs. Set them in front of the dog sled you will make from the directions on page 20.
- 3. Build an ice palace with marshmallows! Cover a flat piece of cardboard with aluminum foil. Spread vanilla frosting on the open ends of several paper cups and invert them to stick to the foil. The Road to Statehood

After the Louisiana Purchase in 1803. Lieutenant Zebulon Pike was sent to find suitable places to construct forts in Minnesota. Under the protection of the U.S. government and its soldiers, Minnesota grew rapidly. Steamboats brought goods and settlers up the Mississippi River. Many railroads, as well as bands of covered wagons, traveled far to reach the new land. Treaties with the Native Americans opened up more of Minnesota for settlement.

In 1848, the population was large enough to allow the region to officially become the Minnesota Territory. By 1857, Minnesota had a population of just over 150,000, large enough to apply for statehood. Minnesota became a state on May 11, 1858.

Today, Minnesota's population is more than 5 million! The city of Minneapolis has about 380,000 residents, and Saint Paul has a population of about 285,000.

Science: Cook It!

Baked Walleye with Wild Rice

Wild rice is an important product of Minnesota. Enjoy this state specialty!

Ingredients:

1½ sticks of butter

½ cup chopped onions

1 8-oz can sliced mushrooms

1 cup uncooked wild rice (can use boxed or packaged rice)

6 ounces of sliced almonds

1 cup Italian-seasoned bread crumbs

½ cup grated parmesan cheese

8 fresh walleye filets

Cook the wild rice. Melt ½ stick of butter in a frying pan. Saute onions in the butter. Add mushrooms and wild rice. Put aside.

Season the filets with salt and pepper as desired. Mix bread crumbs and cheese together. Roll filets in bread crumb and cheese mixture. Place the filets in the oven and bake at 450°F for 15 minutes.

Melt the remaining butter in the frying pan. Saute the sliced almonds in the butter. When serving, spoon the almond/butter mixture over the filets and the rice. Makes 8 servings.

Dog Sled Craft






Materials: several clean popsicle sticks, flat wooden toothpicks, wood glue, wire cutters, one long white pipecleaner

- 1. Lay two popsicle sticks down for runners. Cut two sticks in half. Lay two halves on each other and glue them on the runners, one on each end. Leave a small amount of space on each end. Let it dry.
- 2. Lay four sticks down in the exact middle of the runners (next to one another) as a flat base. Glue them down so that one end fits squarely and the other end sticks out over the runners. Allow it to dry.
- 3. Cut four more sticks in half. Glue five of the halves together as shown laying the pieces on two more stick halves, which will serve as the back support. Glue one half at the very bottom of the piece and one at the top, but leave a little room at the top so the five curved tops still show (see picture).
- 4. Glue the piece from Step #3 on the end of the runners where the base ends squarely.
- 5. Glue two sticks as rails along the base. The flat part of the sticks should face sideways. Glue the tops next to the vertical piece and the bottoms next to the base. The rails should slope downward like a slide.
- 6. Cut flat toothpicks in three different heights. Make two equal sets of cut toothpicks. Glue them to the side rails and runners at the intervals shown.
- 7. Cut two small sections of pipecleaner and arch them.
- 8. Glue one arch at the end of the base for the front of the basket. Glue the other at the top for a handlebar as shown.

Note: Ask an adult to help you with the wirecutters or pliers!
