

12	Botany	Spanish moss is a flowering plant that grows on large trees like live oak or bald cypress in the southeastern U.S. It is often called "air plant" because it hangs from tree branches and absorbs its nutrients and water from the air and rainfall.
13	Human Body	Dehydration occurs when the body does not have as much water and fluids as it should. When severe, dehydration can be fatal! Babies, children, and the elderly are particularly susceptible to dehydration.
13	Vocabulary	To be "wary" is to be very cautious.
14	Idioms	To "let the cat out of the bag" is to disclose something secret, often without intending to do so.
15	Nature	Hummingbirds are very small birds. Their name comes from the humming sound made by their rapidly beating wings.
17	Geography	Peachtree City, Georgia, is Christina and Grant's hometown. Located south of Atlanta, it is known for its extensive network of golf cart paths. Residents use golf carts to travel around the area in much the same way as cars.
21	Business	A real estate agent acts as an intermediary between sellers and buyers of property like houses and land.
21	Technology	Mimi has an iPhone, so when she "swiped the screen," she made a swiping motion to navigate on her phone. Do you know how to work that type of cell phone?
24	Transportation	Most golf carts hold four passengers so Miss Emma's is a deluxe version! One nice thing about a six-passenger cart is all the riders can face forward.
25	Botany	Kudzu is a climbing vine from Japan commonly seen in the southeastern U.S. Kudzu was originally used to control erosion, but has become a problem because it grows so fast and often blankets large areas. Kudzu vines can grow as much as one foot per day in the summer months!

25	Figure of Speech	To say that something is "off the beaten path" means it is isolated, or away from areas where people usually travel.
25	History	The Victorian era revolves around the career of Great Britain's Queen Victoria, who was crowned in 1837 and died in 1901. Many changes took place during this period, due in large part to the Industrial Revolution.
26	Vocabulary	A turret is a small tower that rises vertically from a building.
26	Word Usage	A "painted lady" is a term used to describe a Victorian or Edwardian house painted in three or more colors.
26	Business	A funeral home is a business that provides burial and funeral services for people who have died and their families.
30	Vocabulary	A coffin is a long, narrow box (typically made of wood) in which a body is buried or cremated.
31	Science	Embalming is a process that treats a dead body to protect it from decay. The purpose is to preserve human remains temporarily to make the body suitable to display at a funeral.
32	Vocabulary	To be prissy is to be excessively prim and proper. Do you know anyone who is prissy?
32	Botany	Wisteria is a climbing plant with groups of small purple, blue, or white flowers hanging from it. Wisteria vines climb by wrapping themselves around any available support like a tree or wall.
36	Vocabulary	To be enthralled is to be captivated or fascinated by something.
36	Architecture	A veranda is a porch or balcony, usually roofed and often partly enclosed, extending along the outside of a building.
37	Personality	Mimi finds it easy to imagine how beautiful the old funeral home can be once it is fixed up. She has a positive outlook, and a very creative mind. She is expressing optimism.
38	Personality	Grant responds to Mimi's optimism by reminding her of all the problems that could occur with this real estate purchase. Grant is expressing pessimism, the opposite of optimism.

39	Vocabulary	To embark is to begin a course of action, especially one that is important or demanding.
42	Business	Mimi hopes the old funeral home will be a good investment, something that is worth buying because it may be profitable or useful in the future. Can you think of something your family has purchased in hopes that it will be a good investment?
43	Vocabulary	Intuition can be described as an inner knowing without deduction or reasoning, or a gut feeling. Can you think of a time when you had an intuition about something?
45	Legal Issues	Many legal proceedings require that a witness be present to verify that the signature on the document belongs to the person whose name is on the document. A witness should be someone not related to either party, and who does not benefit from the contract.
46	Business	Mimi is excited that she has purchased her first piece of commercial property, which is buildings or land intended to generate a profit.
46	Background Information	A skeleton key most likely got its name from its resemblance to a skeletal figure. These keys were used in the U.S. from colonial times through the 1940s. Have you ever seen a skeleton key?
47	Idioms	To have "cold feet" means you become nervous or frightened about doing something.
48	Figure of Speech	Christina explains to Grant what Mimi means by "a pig in a poke." A poke is a bag. The term dates back as early as the 1500s, where a buyer was advised not to buy a pig unless he could see it!
49	Nature	A lightning bug is a winged beetle commonly known as a firefly. A chemical reaction takes place within dedicated light organs in their abdomens to produce light with almost no heat. Have you ever seen a lightning bug?
51	Figure of Speech	To do something "first-class" means to do it with the highest quality or excellence. In other words, Mimi's book shop was going to be <i>really</i> nice!

52	Human Body	The writing on the brittle tag looked as if it had been written by an old person with "arthritic" hands. Arthritis is a painful joint disorder that causes inflammation of one or more joints.
56	Vocabulary	A parlor is a room in a home set aside for greeting or entertaining visitors.
59	Architecture	A gazebo is a freestanding, roofed, usually open-sided structure that provides a shady resting place.
60	Writing	A diary is a daily record of personal activities, reflections, or feelings. Today, many people use the term "journal" for a diary. Do you keep a journal or a diary?
61	Idioms	When the author writes that "Mimi made a beeline to the gazebo," she means that Mimi headed straight towards something, in the same way a bee would fly quickly to its destination.
63	Figure of Speech	Someone who is "chicken-livered" is cowardly. The term comes from observations that chickens are easily frightened and an ancient belief that the liver was the seat of love and passion. So, a person who is "chicken-livered" lacks vigor, spirit, and courage!
64	Vocabulary	A mote is a tiny speck of something. Have you ever seen motes of dust floating in the air when sunlight streams though a room?
64	Vocabulary	To fret over something is to be uneasy, or worried, about it. Can you think of something you have fretted over in the past?
66	History	The name "Bone-a-part" is a reference to Napoleon Bonaparte (1769-1821), a great military leader and emperor of France.
66	History	The name of Mimi's mummy, "Toot 'n come in," refers to a famous Egyptian pharaoh named Tutankhamen, or King Tut. His mummy was discovered in the 1920s.
67	Language	The term "an attic attack" is an example of alliteration, where the first letter of each word in a phrase begins with the same sound or letter. Can you think of an example of alliteration? Don't you think alliteration is just fun to listen to?

71	Science	A test tube is a finger-length glass tube open at the top and rounded into a U-shape at the bottom. Chemists commonly use test tubes to hold, mix, or heat chemicals for experiments.
72	Vocabulary	Ventilation is the intentional movement of air from the outside of a building to the inside.
76	Figurative Language	The author is using a simile when she writes that Papa's tummy "growled as loud as a foghorn." How does that use of language really help you "hear" the noise coming from Papa's stomach?
77	Vocabulary	When Mimi "downed" her glass of iced tea, she swallowed it quickly.
78	Figure of Speech	When something is "out of kilter," it is not working or adjusted properly. Have you ever heard that expression? Can you use it in a sentence?
79	Vocabulary	A confab is an informal, private discussion.
80	Figure of Speech	To "chicken out" is to give up doing something out of fear. Christina worries that both she and Mimi might "chicken out"!
81	Language	The term "under the guise of" means an appearance or presentation concealing the true nature of something.
83	Language	An "ulterior motive" is a motive that is intentionally kept concealed. So, is Christina wondering if whoever left the notes has a secret motive?
84	Writing	The writer uses initials like "BD," "RH," and "CC" to represent mystery terms. Did you like that technique? Were you curious as to what each term meant?
86	Character Development	McKenzie gets irritated when Grant teases her and wiggles his fingers in front of her as he makes ghost sounds. Why do you think she got so upset?
87	Body Language	Grant "had his hands on his hips and his face up to her face." How does he feel right then?

88	Language	The kids decide to yell "GERONIMO" if they run into any problems. The word is typically yelled by someone when they are going to jump from a great height. It is said this all started in 1940 when a U.S. Army paratrooper yelled "GERONIMO" to show he was not afraid to jump out of a plane. He had watched a movie the night before featuring the famous Apache Indian chief Geronimo.
89	Vocabulary	"Doom" refers some type of terrible fate, so Grant fears that something bad will happen to him as he goes up to the second floor.
94	Writing Technique	When the author says that Thomas' hand is quivering, what does that tell you about how Thomas feels?
95	Human Body	McKenzie waited at the attic doorway until her eyes adjusted to the lack of light. The pupils of her eyes were widening to let in as much light as possible so she could see better in the dim light.
95	Vocabulary	A tremulous sigh is one marked by shaking or slight quivering from uneasiness or fear.
95	Language	A "helter-skelter" pattern is one marked by disorder or confusion.
96	Body Language	McKenzie clenched her arms tight and clamped her front teeth down on her lower lip when she was stressed. Do you do any particular things with your body when you are stressed or under pressure?
96	Vocabulary	Burlap is a strong, coarsely woven cloth used to make bags. Twine is strong string made of two or more strands twisted together.
97	Writing Technique	When Grant leaned against the wall and it shuddered, what did you think was going to happen next? Did you anticipate what actually happened?
98	Vocabulary	To activate means to cause something to function or operate.
99	Home Decorating	Damask is a rich patterned fabric of cotton, linen, silk, or wool often used for curtains. Sheers are thin curtains that allow a good amount of light into a room, but still provide privacy for people inside.

99	Science Fiction	A "time machine" is a fictional device that moves a person into the past or the future. Would you like to go into a time machine and travel to a different era? If so, what time period would you choose?
100	Science	Hunters often like to mount the heads of deer or other animals on a wall in their home or office. The process used to preserve the animals is called taxidermy. An animal's skin is removed, treated chemically, and then placed over a mannequin made of wood, wire, or foam.
100	History	An inkstand is a tray or rack for pens and bottles of ink. The fountain pen, and later the ballpoint pen, eventually eliminated the need for an inkstand.
100	Vocabulary	A ledger is a book in which the financial information of a business is recorded.
103	Behavior	Why did the kids react in such a frightened manner when Christina appeared at the gazebo?
105	Imagery	Can you "hear" the scene where the kids listen to "frogs burp and crickets chirp"?
105	Character Analysis	When Christina squeezes Grant's shoulder, what character trait is she displaying? How does this act show how she feels about her little brother?
106	Reasoning	Why does Christina suggest the kids search the house one last time? What does this tell the reader about how she feels about Mimi's book shop?
106	Behavior	Why do some people dislike the dentist? How do you feel about going to the dentist? Why is it important to take care of your teeth?
109	Imagery	What descriptive words does the author use to paint the scene where the girls find the secret panel?
110	Architecture	A spiral staircase is a staircase that is tightly curved. They are often used in tight spaces where there is not enough room for standard stairs.
110	Vocabulary	Something that is sturdy is strongly and solidly built.

111	Behavior	Why did Grant and Thomas sneak on tiptoe around to the front of the building where the door was located?
111	Science	A crematorium, or crematory, is a place where bodies are reduced down to basic chemical compounds by burning at high temperatures.
112	Vocabulary	A warren is a maze-like place where one may become easily lost.
113	Senses	Humans can distinguish more than 10,000 different smells, which are detected by specialized receptor neurons lining the nose. Can you think of a smell you really love, and one you truly dislike?
115	Vocabulary	To be petrified is to be paralyzed or numb with fear.
115	Figure of Speech	A "sticky wicket" is a metaphor used to describe a difficult situation. It comes from the game of cricket. When the central part of the cricket field (known as the pitch or the wicket) gets wet, the path of the ball becomes unpredictable—therein creating a difficult situation, or a "sticky wicket."
116	Vocabulary	Synonyms for the word "tentative" are "uncertain" or "hesitant." When Christina takes one tentative step at a time, what does that tell you about how she is feeling?
118	Vocabulary	To cackle is to laugh or talk in a shrill manner. Do you know what shrill means?
123	Idioms	Something that is the "center of attention" is someone or something everyone notices. Do you like to be the center of attention? If not, do you know someone who does like it?
125	Character Analysis	Why do you think Wilbur started to cry when Grant asked him if he used to play around the building when he was a kid?
127	People	Wilbur was elderly but had the mind of a child. Do you know anyone like that? What can you do to help someone like that?
129	Vocabulary	Wilbur "beamed" when the new sign for Wilbur's Place was put up. That means he smiled a really big smile! Can you think of something that made you so happy you beamed?

131	Character Analysis	Mimi wanted a writing desk by the front window in the turret so she could look out and see customers come and go as she worked. What does that tell you about Mimi?
133	Business	A new business often has a grand opening and/or ribbon cutting ceremony to attract attention. In a ribbon-cutting ceremony, a ribbon is often stretched across the front of a business. The owner or another important person (like the mayor) cuts the ribbon to symbolize the opening of the business.
136	Business	Grant was given the task of creating Mimi's website. Why is a website so important to a business? What are some things customers can learn when they go to a company's website?

#### Discussion Questions

- 1. Christina mentions that she and Grant have attended a few summer camps. Have you ever been to a summer camp? If so, what type of camp was it, and what did you do? If not, is there a particular summer camp you would like to go to?
- 2. Mimi was able to visualize how the old funeral home could be turned into a book shop. What are some character traits that Mimi possessed that enabled her to turn this negative into a positive?
- 3. The old funeral home appears to be a spooky place to Grant and Christina, but funeral homes have a very important purpose. Can you think of several ways they help families who have lost a loved one?
- 4. Mimi's family comes over to "The Shop" to help clean up the old funeral home and the grounds. Why is it often more productive and enjoyable to have a big group tackle a big project like a cleanup?
- 5. The author describes Christina and McKenzie exploring the attic, and Grant and Thomas exploring the basement. Can you easily picture the scenes? What are some words the author uses to help set the scenes?
- 6. Would you like to start a business like Mimi did? If so, what type of business would you start? Why did you choose that business?
- 7. The old funeral home had lots of spooky rooms and secret passages. What was your favorite place and why?

- The population of Peachtree City is about 37,000.
- Peachtree City was founded in 1959.
- Peachtree City has a system of golf cart paths stretching for more than 90 miles throughout the city. Many households use their golf cart as an extra vehicle, and many businesses have special parking spaces for golf carts.
- Peachtree City's regional airport hosts an air show every year.
- In 2011, Family Circle magazine listed Peachtree City in its list of the Top 10 Cities for Families.
- "Plan to Stay" is the city's slogan.
- Peachtree City is located in Georgia's Piedmont Region, and is considered part of metro Atlanta.

- 3. Mimi's Haunted Book Shop needs new carpet. If the book shop requires 2,225 square yards of carpet installed at a cost of \$13.99 per square yard, how much will Mimi have to pay?
- 4. Christina has planned all the food for the Grand Opening of the Book Shop. #### English: Write It!

- 1. Pretend you are the editor of the Peachtree City newspaper. Write an article about the grand opening of Mimi's Haunted Book Shop. Pretend you have interviewed Mimi, Christina, and Grant. #### **Book Facts!**

- The United Kingdom and the United States are the top two countries in books published each year.
- On average, a book store browser spends 8 seconds looking at a book's front cover and 15 seconds looking at the back cover.
- Women buy 55% of the fiction books sold.
- The most popular setting for a fiction book is New York City, followed by London.
- In 2010, publishers sold 2.56 billion books in all formats (hardback, paperback, or e-book).
- 114 million e-books were sold in 2010.
- E-books are becoming more popular due to the declining prices of readers like Amazon's Kindle or the Nook from Barnes and Noble.
- The favorite fiction category is mystery and suspense.

#### Art: Create It!

- 1. What do you think Wilbur looks like? He is in his nineties, but has the mind of a child. Draw a sketch of Wilbur tending to the vegetables in his garden.
- 2. Make some Mimi's Haunted Book Shop cupcakes! You'll need a chocolate cake mix, cupcake papers, vanilla icing, and little candies like M&Ms or Skittles. With an adult's help, make a batch of chocolate cupcakes (Mimi loves chocolate!). Ice them with vanilla frosting. Then, use candies to write the first initial of each character on each individual cupcake. For example, Grant's cupcake would have a G on the top. Christina's cupcake would have a C on it, etc. Don't forget the cats (Dewey and Decimal), and Bookie, the English sheepdog!
- 3. Create a full-page newspaper advertisement for Mimi's Haunted Book Shop. Make sure to include the store hours, address, and telephone number. Don't forget this is a "haunted" book shop, so make your ad spooky and scary, as well as attention-getting!
- 4. Pick a room that has been remodeled in the book shop, like the embalming room turned into the Tombstone Tea Room, or the basement turned into a place kids could come for a story hour or craft time. Then, create that room in a shoebox diorama. Use construction paper, small toys, modeling clay, craft supplies like pipe cleaners or cotton balls—whatever you need!
- 5. Use the Internet to find pictures of Georgia's state flag and the Peachtree City flag. Draw and color each flag. Which one do you like better?
- 6. Make a "GRAND OPENING" banner for Mimi's Haunted Book Shop. If you don't have any long sheets of paper, you can staple or tape 8-1/2 x 11" sheets together. There's one important thing to remember: Mimi's favorite color is red!

#### **Bonus Info!**

#### **Writing Tips**

Every story has to have characters, a plot, and a setting.

Characters are the people in the story. Who are the main characters in *The Mystery of Mimi's Haunted Book Shop?* 

A plot is what happens in the story. Without a plot, the story has no action and no meaning. What is the plot of this mystery?

A setting is where the story takes place. What is the setting in *The Mystery of Mimi's Haunted Book Shop?* 

There are many different types of stories you can write. Mysteries (like this story!), adventure, comedy, drama, romance, non-fiction (that means it's true!), and the list goes on and on!

#### Science: Cook It!

#### A Gingerbread Book Shop

You can make Mimi's Haunted Book Shop out of gingerbread by following the recipe below. And remember to ask for an adult's help!

#### **Gingerbread House**

Cream 1/2 cup butter (softened at room temperature) and 3/4 cup packed brown sugar with a fork or an electric mixer. Mixture should be light and fluffy. Add 2 eggs, one at a time, and mix. Beat in 3/4 molasses and set bowl aside. In another bowl, stir 4 1/2 cups all-purpose flour, 1 1/4 teaspoons baking soda, 1 tablespoon cinnamon, 2 teaspoons ground ginger, and 1/2 teaspoon allspice. Gradually mix the wet and dry ingredients together. Finish mixing with your hands. Separate the dough into two parts, flatten into a pancake shape, and cover in plastic wrap to chill 2 hours or more. Roll out the dough on a lightly floured surface and cut into rectangular and triangular shapes to make a small house. Bake on a cookie sheet at 350 degrees F for about 10-15 minutes. Remove and allow to cool. Decorate the house with squeeze icing tubes, candies, and frosting.

#### **Ingredients**

½ cup butter (softened)

<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup packed brown sugar

2 eggs

<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup molasses

4-1/2 cups all-purpose flour

1-1/4 tsp baking soda


1 T cinnamon

2 tsp ground ginger

½ tsp allspice

vanilla frosting

#### **Bonus Info!**

#### Peaches on My Mind!

Mimi's Haunted Book Shop is located in Georgia, the Peach State! About 40 different varieties of peaches are grown there today, and about 60 streets in Atlanta, the capital city, have "Peachtree" in their name! Spaniards first introduced peach plants to the New World. The Lower Creek Indians established a Georgia tradition when they planted peach orchards in the southwest part of the state.

Follow the recipe below for a tasty Georgia specialty—peach cobbler!

#### **Easy Bake Cobbler**

Grease a square baking pan with butter and add 2 cups canned peaches, drained, 1 tablespoon flour, 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon, and 1/2 cup sugar. Stir. Using a can of crescent roll dough, roll out gently until flat. Cut out cookie cutter shapes and arrange atop peaches. Sprinkle with a little sugar and cinnamon and bake at 425 degrees F in toaster oven until crust is golden, about 35 minutes.

#### **How Does Your Garden Grow?**


In The Mystery of Mimi's Haunted Book Shop, Wilbur tells Mimi, Papa, and the kids

Cut three paper towel rolls in half lengthwise so you have six curved channels. Tape your pieces side by side to create plowed rows in a field. Use construction paper, plants, fabric, or other materials to create rows of crops. Use cotton balls for cotton, yellow fabric scraps for corn, or orange construction paper scraps for carrots. Use your creativity! Make each row a different crop that grows in Georgia and label them all. Build a scarecrow in your field to keep the birds away!




